


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

Rev. Elisabeth Leads Instructed Eucharist

During the month of August, our Gospel readings came from Jesus' "Bread of Life" discourse in the Gospel of John. To help us delve deeper into the Gospel, we have been exploring the Eucharist, through a Sunday school series and an Instructed Eucharist on August 15. Holy Eucharist literally means "sacred thanksgiving," reflecting our belief that our service is an act of praise and thanksgiving to God for the gifts given to us in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. Episcopalians believe in the "real presence" of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist, meaning that Jesus is present with us as we celebrate, but there are a variety of views, and no strict dogma, on how this takes place.

The pandemic has challenged us in our celebration of the Eucharist, as more people join worship online and our practice has needed to respond to safety concerns. Despite these challenges, the Eucharist remains a vital source of nourishment for us as disciples and a powerful symbol of our unity in Christ, even despite temporary separation.

Damaged Historic Marker Replaced

Rickard and Del Price, with the help of Fore, replaced the damaged historic marker that was dedicated on church grounds in 2011. As time went by the marker suffered mower damage and had to be replaced—not once, but three times. The recent replacement marker is the third and hopefully the last to be remade.

St. Alban's is one of the oldest Episcopal Churches in the Diocese of Mississippi. The original church was erected in 1858 but destroyed during the Siege of Vicksburg. The second church, built on the same site, was erected in 1870 and served the church until 1928 when the new Gothic style sanctuary was built. The 1870's church remains and serves as the Parish Hall. Because of its rural setting and vast park-like grounds, St. Alban's is often referred to as the *Church in the Country*.

All four markers were made by Sewah Studios in Marietta, Ohio.



Safety Improvements at Church

Look around the church and you might notice some small changes designed to enhance our emergency preparedness. These include more fire extinguishers, a new first aid kit, and an AED (automated external defibrillator). A Safety Planning Team, composed of Junior Warden David May, Sharon Cummins, John Frey, Jim Price, Lance Stewart, Dalton Thames and Theo Williams, has been working to improve how the church prepares for and responds to emergencies. The team has more plans in the works, including offering CPR training at the church and increasing lighting in the parking lot, as well as improving training for ushers and anyone who might be called to respond to an emergency at the church. Church Enjoying New Rodent Deterrent System

Rev. Elisabeth's Epistle

This month my mind and my prayers have been dominated by two trains of thought: one about the Eucharist, the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the other about the resurgence of the coronavirus in our state. These might seem to be two contradictory trains of thought, but the more space they've occupied together in my mind and in my prayers, the more connections I've seen. One image in particular unites the two trains of thought: the image of the body.

In one of the oldest understandings of the Eucharist, sharing Christ's body and blood knits us into one body with him and with other believers. Here is Paul, writing to the Corinthians: "The bread that we break, is it not a sharing in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread" (1 Cor 10:16-17). Paul uses this image of the body often to describe the Christian community, emphasizing how each part is needed, and if one part suffers, all suffer. This is the attitude I believe is missing in so much of what passes for conversation about our current coronavirus crisis. Many people still don't seem to understand that there is no way out of this pandemic until we realize that we are all part of one body. Keeping ourselves safe as individuals is not good enough. We must be willing to look out for the health and well-being of the entire body. We must consider the interests of our neighbors. The coronavirus has revealed what Paul knew to be true: the body is only as healthy as its least healthy member. We are all connected, and what affects one, affects all.

This is why the Eucharist is so important for us to practice. Jesus is teaching us week in and week out through the Eucharist what it means to be part of a body. And not just any body, but his body! Jesus is teaching us how to see ourselves as connected to something bigger, and through his example of self-sacrifice, he also teaches us how to place the needs of our neighbor equal to our own. These are lessons I believe we need now more than ever.
