♥Billie's Corner

Dear Saint Alban's Community,

As I was developing a program that I have presented at several churches throughout the diocese, I included a family story. The topic of the program was entitled, "Tis a Gift to be Simple ..." The focus of the presentation was the recognition of art in the ordinary.

The program was presented with lots of visual aids. I searched the house for some of my favorite paintings, sculptures, books and quilts. As I spoke, the Power Point presentation projected photographs of members of our church family celebrating the simple gift of a sharing community.

The family story I told pointed out the commonality of a crazy quilt sampler and the community of the Body of Christ. How did a crazy quilt compare to the Body of Christ? My family story will explain.

I have a crazy quilt sampler that my maternal great-grandmother made in the early 20th century. My great-grandmother, Ibbie Smith, was ahead of her time. She was a career woman long before the Women's Movement was ever thought about. She was a widow who needed to make living to support her only child---that child was my grandmother.

Ibbie owned a hat shop located on Main Street in Memphis, Tennessee. The crazy quilt sampler was put together by Ibbie with the scraps of fabric left over from the hats she had made. Lots of different fabrics of random shapes and sizes are intricately stitched together to make a unified pattern.

Community church life can be compared to random patches stitched together to make a unified pattern—we call it the Body of Christ.

The Saint Alban's community is an example of diversity stitched together by way of Baptism, Holy Communion and our relationship with each other. We are summoned to make the Body of Christ visible in the world!

At the beginning of Lent, I received a card from the Brothers of Saint John the Evangelist, an Episcopal religious community whose monastery is located in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The message speaks to our Saint Alban's community:

At the heart of our founder's vision for the Society of Saint John the Evangelist was that our religious community be a 'community of love,'... Our founder believed that if we lived like this, others would be drawn to God through us. That is the heart of what we hope is our witness by living community life.



We are not a formal religious community who live together in a monastery; we are a church community confronted with ordinary and sometimes extraordinary circumstances in our homes, workplaces, schools and church. We are called to be a *community of love*—a crazy quilt intricately stitched together by the love God offers us and our reflection of God's love shining through us and out to others. May we share the vision of the Society of Saint John the Evangelist—to become a *community of love* that draws others to God!

Josie's Journal

Little did I know nine years ago when I ordered the first set of coins for Lent that it would evolve into a tradition that makes Lent special. Each year for Lent I order Lenten coins to be distributed to the community that I touch shoulders with during Lent.

This year I ordered five hundred coins and I have fifty remaining. I shared my Lenten coins with The St. Alban's and St. Mary's (Bolton) communities, DOCC (Disciples of Christ in Community), a Discernment Committee, the Twelve Steps to Wholeness group at the Rectory, the Tuesday night Bible Study and the staff of the Warren County Juvenile Court.

The Lenten Arts performers—the Bovina Baptist Church Bell Choir, the Jubilee Singers, Mississippi Community Clarinet Choir, Holy Trinity Conservatory string students and Josh Nichols, organist—received coins. Coins were mailed to fifteen shut-ins who receive regular monthly cards from me. They were also mailed to the diocesan staff and St. Mark's (Jackson). No one was overlooked including a Mutual Credit Union teller and a customer at Martin's at Midtown.

Well, what do the coins mean? I distribute them in an effort to create a conscious awareness of Lent each time the recipient comes into contact with the coin. Coins are used in various ways by recipients—put in a coin purse, put in a pocket, put on a chain or key ring. The great thing about the coin is that it creates a memory each time the recipient looks at or touches it.

I am an active partaker in *Lent Madness*, an Internet competition created in 2010 by The Rev. Tim Schenck, rector of the Episcopal parish of St. John the Evangelist in Hingham, Massachusetts. Rev. Schenck brainstormed the idea of *Lent Madness* as a fun and engaging way for people to learn about the men and women comprising the Church's calendar of Saints. The experience is very educational.

Lenten Madness is a creative approach to learning the life stories of forty saints during Lent. The poster on the wall in the parish hall shows the progress starting Ash Wednesday and concluding on Maundy Thursday. The winner of the 2013 GOLDEN HALO is Frances Perkins who was appointed secretary of labor in 1933 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Of her position she wrote, "I came to Washington to work for God, FDR, and the millions of forgotten, plain common workingmen."

I look forward to Lent next year—new coins and a new slate of saints for Lent Madness.
