Children's Outdoor Chapel Service

Children's Service



Led by the Reverend Elisabeth Malphurs, St. Alban's children and parents gathered at the outdoor chapel on November 15 for a late afternoon Children's Service to celebrate being together and to thank God for His many blessings.

In welcoming everyone, Rev. Elisabeth explained that the word "Eucharist" literally means thanksgiving and was an appropriate focus for the service, given the fact that Thanksgiving Day was then only days away.

Harris Southall volunteered to read the lesson from Chapter 8 of Deuteronomy in which Moses describes to the Israelites the bounty awaiting them in the Promised Land and reminds them to obey God's commands, practice humility, and remain thankful for all God has done for them.

Rev. Elisabeth read Luke's account of Jesus' healing of ten lepers, only one of whom returns to praise God and to thank Jesus for making him well.

The children and I talked about things for which they are thankful and then made a Chain of Thanksgivings. Both children and adults wrote on slips of paper the names of people and things that bless their lives. These slips of paper became links in a colorful chain which was draped on the altar prior to the Eucharist and later moved to the little altar in the Parish House. The group also used “A Litany of Thanksgiving” from, *The Book of Common Prayer* (pp 837) as reminders of other ways they are blessed.

Rev. Elisabeth invited the children to gather around the altar to help her celebrate the Eucharist. They raised their arms in praise and made the sign of the cross with her and then received the bread.

Following the blessing, the children ran for the play yard while adults talked and moved candles and other items from the chapel back to the church.

“O Lord, support us all the day long, until the shadows lengthen, and the evening comes, and the busy world is hushed, and the fever of life is over, and our work is done.” from *The Book of Common Prayer* (pp 833).





All Souls' Eve Service



Boy Scout's Workday in Outdoor Chapel



While we're not called to wage battles to the death conquering other lands, I think that God still calls us today to take on seemingly insurmountable odds in helping others and spreading the word.

Annual Parish Meeting

Just a reminder about the St. Alban's Annual Parish Meeting, which is scheduled for Sunday, January 10. This year you will have a choice of how you participate, either in person or online through Zoom. We will be electing a new Junior Warden to serve a 2-year term and two members to serve 3-year terms. The Nominating Committee has already drafted a slate of nominees, but we are still accepting additional nominations. Please ensure that you have permission of the person you are nominating and then submit nominations to me, Nominations Committee Chairman.

Requirements to serve as a member of the Vestry are contained in our church by-laws. Lay members of the parish in good standing who are confirmed communicants, at least 21 years old, canonically resident in the parish and entitled to suffrage at the meeting are eligible to serve on the Vestry. In good standing means, in part, that the member attends services at St. Alban's regularly (this year, that means online or in person) and gives of their time, talent, and treasure to the church. Employees of the church are not eligible to serve on Vestry. This year our Vestry has been meeting virtually by Zoom, so potential Vestry members must be willing to learn how to use Zoom.

We will also be updating our parish by laws to include virtual meeting procedures and approving reports from various committees of the church.

I would also like to mention a financial giving option that we have recently put into place. If you have stocks, bonds or securities that you would like to donate to the church, you may gift these to the St Alban's Brokerage Account that we have set up with Raymond James Financial services here in Vicksburg. Michael Southall has the details and can walk you through the process. Susan and I have done this recently and it's a great way to donate without having to pay the capital gains tax. This mechanism can also be used with Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) from IRA accounts. For more information, you can contact me, Michael or Ann Tompkins.

Rev. Elisabeth's Epistle

I'm tired of waiting. It feels like we've been waiting since March...like we entered Lent and never quite came out of it. When the pandemic first started, I remember thinking we just needed to hold on for a few weeks. Then weeks became months, and then it became clear that the road back to some kind of normal was going to be longer than anyone expected. Now we are entering Advent, this season of expectation and waiting, and frankly, I'm tired! I'm done with waiting!

I think these feelings of restlessness and impatience are actually very authentic Advent feelings. While we might sentimentalize Advent as being our annual watchful waiting for the birth of the Christ child, Advent is so much more. It is about remembering the joy of the incarnation. But it is also about looking forward to Christ's coming again, when God's kingdom will be fully revealed on earth. And as we hear in our Advent readings, no one knows when that will happen. So, we wait with restlessness and impatience, knowing that God is acting in God's own time, not on any schedule we can predict or control. Advent becomes a chance for us to practice hope in the midst of waiting. Hope in the midst of uncertain, restless waiting. Waiting that doesn't have a known end point.

I, for one, could use more practice in sustaining hope during this kind of waiting. Sometimes it is the smallest things that help us carry on while we wait...lighting candles in the Advent wreath, playing "O Come O Come Emmanuel," writing a card to reach out to someone else. I have been uplifted by each of you when I hear the things you are doing to stay connected with each other and the church. So, we will continue to wait--for a vaccine, for the chance to hug our loved ones again, for a full church, for potlucks and coffee hour. As we wait, let us encourage one another to "hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful" (Hebrews 10:23).

Advent is the beginning of a new church year. It is filled with anticipation and waiting. I would like to share the traditions in our family.

We set the Advent wreath in the center of the dinner table and light one candle the first week, two for the second week, three for the third week, and four for the fourth week. We select a reading to think about and then we eat dinner and extinguish the candle at the end of the meal.

A new tradition is the Tea Advent Calendar. Each day features a different tea to try. I like tea and it is a way to relax in the anticipation of Christmas.

For 2020 I added a William Morris Calendar of toiletries. Each day is a new hand cream, body wash, bath salts or cuticle cream. I am looking forward to trying it out. Sometimes I want to jump ahead but the calendar is labeled to prevent that.


