

## Bishop Gray to Visit St. Alban's on March 11th

On Sunday, March 11, Duncan M. Gray III, the ninth bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Mississippi, will make his annual visit to St. Alban's. A congregational meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the Parish Hall to meet and greet the bishop. During the meeting, Bishop Gray will talk about ministries that are near and dear to his heart. The celebration of the Holy Eucharist will take place in the nave at 10:00 a.m. Confirmation and reaffirmations are included in the celebration of the Eucharist.



Bishop Gray, a native of Canton, is the third generation of his family to serve as bishop of Mississippi. His grandfather, Duncan M. Gray Sr. became bishop in 1943 and his father, Duncan M. Gray, Jr. in 1974.

A Pot Luck Luncheon will be held in the Parish Hall at 11 a.m. Following lunch, the bishop will meet with the vestry in the rectory.

After leaving St. Alban's, Bishop Gray will travel to St. Mary's, Bolton, for a 3:00 p.m. congregational meeting followed by a 4:00 p.m. celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

## Jubilee Singers Receive Standing Ovations



On Wednesday, February 29, the internationally acclaimed *Jubilee Singers* of Hinds Community College, Utica Campus, performed for the Lenten Arts Program Series at St. Alban's Church. The audience expressed their appreciation by giving the performers and the conductor, Dr. Bobby Cooper, two standing ovations.

"This year will mark my 40<sup>th</sup> year as choir director at Hinds Community College in Utica, Dr. Cooper commented. "I'm looking forward to a full season of performances. I'm also excited about seeing and visiting with many of my former students who will be returning to share in the yearlong celebrations." Dr. Cooper's reputation as a first rate choral director is widespread. The students who take part in the *Jubilee Singers* demonstrate his skilled leadership with their outstanding performances.

Dr. Cooper arrived at Utica Community College in 1972 to teach in the music department. After learning the "musical background" of the colored institute, he decided to revive the *Utica Institute Jubilee Singers*, an organization of singers that dates back to 1925 and the earliest history of the *Utica Normal and Industrial Institute for the Training of Colored Young Men and Women*.

As early as 1926, the group began making bus tours of the United States. The money they received for concerts helped to help support the Utica based school. The singers, whose style was inspired by the *Fisk Jubilee Singers* of Nashville, performed in New York as well as other major cities across America. Those memorable performances helped to establish *Utica Institute* as one of America's premiere colleges for the advancement of colored students.


In 1972, after Dr. Cooper joined the Utica College faculty as music instructor and choir director, he revived the name, *Jubilee Singers*, and accepted the challenge of reestablishing the unique style of singing popular during the 1920s. "The early singers performed Negro spirituals to help raise funds for the school during the 40-year Holtzclaw era," stated Cooper. "I was so moved by the original group's history, dedication and purpose, I felt compelled to revive the unique quality of the historical plantation-era music."

To attain the unique quality of the original *Jubilee Singers*, Dr. Cooper worked from the original music sheets of days gone by. Today that unique sound has become the hallmark signature for the group. In keeping with the original *Jubilee Singers* (1925-1926), the talented singers receive accolades from audiences all across America as well as abroad.

The Jubilee Singers concluded the concert promising to return to St. Alban's next year. Dr. Cooper announced that the graduating sophomores would return next year to sing for him. That was wonderful news since his remark indicated that the famed conductor will most likely not be retiring at the close of the 2012 school year, a year that marks the end of 40 years of service to Hinds Community College. Dr. Cooper's work is treasured and admired by Hinds Community College, his students, and all the audiences who have had the opportunity to attend one of his unforgettable concerts.


## Lent |s Not Over Yet!

## ✤Billie's Corner

"I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent ..."

Ash Wednesday Service, Book of Common Prayer

I've been giving thought to the invitation I read at the Ash Wednesday service. We were invited to observe a holy Lent. The invitation went on to suggest ways to observe a holy Lent, "by self examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self denial; and by reading and meditation on God's holy Word." It occurred to me that we could think of this as an invitation to live a holy life, not just a holy six weeks.

Applying the worn out cliché, "Today is the first day of the rest of your life," perhaps we could think of Lent as being the first season for the rest of our lives. What would our lives be if we incorporated the disciplines that the *Book of Common Prayer* suggested each day of our lives? What if these disciplines became a Rule of Life, an everyday occurrence for the rest of our lives? Our lives would certainly grow to be more God centered.

Actually, we have a Rule of Life at Saint Alban's Church and within it is the opportunity to integrate the particular spiritual disciplines suggested by the *Book of Common Prayer* for a Holy Lent. Our Rule of Life is simple: *We aspire to worship weekly, pray daily, learn constantly, serve joyfully and live generously.* 

During Lent, I am watching a daily video entitled *Framework for Freedom*. The Brothers of the Society of Saint John the Evangelist are presenting the value of a Rule of Life. One of the brothers emphasized that a Rule of Life provides order to the chaos of our daily living. Brother Curtis Almquist said that a Rule of Life offers a cadence and rhythm to life that can sustain us as we face the challenges and the rewards of everyday life.

Our simple Rule of Life is an instrument to help us become our truest selves. By worshipping, praying, learning, serving and giving, we become who God created us to be. As Brother David Vryhof noted in one of the videos, the end result is not following the Rule of Life, but drawing closer to God and becoming aware of God's presence 24/7.

We have been offered the invitation to observe a holy Lent and to live a holy life. May this Lent continue for the rest of our lives. May we rely on our Rule of Life to draw us closer to God, closer to each other and closer to the needs of the world.

### Dosie's Journal

St. Alban's had a vendor's booth at the Regional Career Fair held at the Vicksburg Convention Center on February 7, 2012. Two thousand students from Vicksburg High, Warren Central High, Grove Street, St. Aloysius, Porter's Chapel, Hinds AHS, South Delta, Port Gibson and Claiborne County Career and Technical Center viewed the exhibits.

The students were given the opportunity to meet representatives from all major Mississippi universities, Nashville Auto & Diesel College and AmeriCorps. Public service careers could be explored at the Vicksburg Police Department, Warren County Sheriff Department, District Attorney's Office and Vicksburg Fire Department booths. Military aspirations were discussed at the Mississippi National Guard, US Army, US Marines and US Air Force exhibits. The Win Job Center displayed advertised options available at their office. Displays were provided by the Child & Parent Center, MADD, United Way of Central Mississippi, River Region, Promise Health Care and River City Chiropractic Clinic for those interested in medical careers.

You might be thinking why did St. Alban's have a booth? I wanted showcase St. Alban's and all that it has to offer. My display consisted of bulletin inserts, *Forward Day by Day*, Lenten booklets, *Our Daily Bread* booklets, *Lenten Prayer Cards*, Bibles and the *Book of Common Prayer*. Everything on the table was available to take home except the Bible and the BCP. At the end of the day I had three booklets left. I took over one hundred handouts.

I talked with students who asked "What is Lent?" "Where is your church?" My response to the Lent question went like this: "Lent is the forty days before Easter. It starts with Ash Wednesday, the day after Fat Tuesday or Mardi Gras and ends on Easter. During Lent you can take on something or give up something. The something is determined by the individual. The something you give up should be something you like. So don't give up broccoli for Lent if you don't eat broccoli. You might decide to give up one hour of texting on your phone each day! You might decide to take on doing you chores at home, obeying your parents, being on time for curfew. You might consider dropping pennies and loose change in a jar and at the end of Lent put it in the collection plate at church."

This was an opportunity to plant a seed and was well worth the day spent at the convention center. During the break at the career fair I visited the display booth and gave out last year's Lenten coins to all the presenters.
