Parish Weekend at Gray Center

For those who attended the Parish Weekend at Gray Center it was obvious that *one* is never too old to go camping! Camp in this case was the wonderful "Big House" located on the property at the entrance of a large and beautiful lake on the outskirts of Canton. In 1946, when the land was purchased for the Mississippi Episcopal Diocese, Bishop Gray, Sr. announced the "good news" in *The Church News*: "We have acquired a conference center and camp site in Madison County which will be known as Rose Hill." The property was described as consisting of 210 acres including a forty-acre lake and two houses, one quite large and arranged like a hotel. The 1940s two-story





house was lovingly nicknamed *The Big House*.

Over the weekend of April 13-15, parish members filled *The Big House* for a weekend of fun and fellowship. Between Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer, campers enjoyed fishing, boating, riding bikes, hiking and all of the fun activities associated with camp life. The thrill of the weekend for Beth Guynes was landing a five-pound bass which won the fishing rodeo! Over the

weekend special music was provided by Karen McCraw and Rodney Ham. On Saturday night, everyone gathered for a fish fry catered by Terry and Charlie Brantley, master chefs.

The weekend was enjoyed immensely by all and if a hymn had been sung before parting ways, instead of *Kumbaya* it would have been, *Bless be the tie that binds, our hearts in Christian love,* The fellowship of kindred minds is like to that above.





The Second Sunday Schedule is Changing!

Beginning in May, we will resume our usual two Eucharist schedule on the second Sunday of each month. With the exception of Mother's Day, we will continue to have a pot luck breakfast on the second Sunday of each month. The pot luck breakfasts will serve as a time to share a communal meal, a time to visit, a time to invite a friend and time to present community outreach and inreach ministries. The breakfast will take place between the two worship services at 10:00 a.m.

The vestry is trying a new format for outreach. Based on charities that St. Alban's members are already involved in, we hope to organize community involvement for large projects and focus on timely donations for smaller projects.

How can a small church approach an ongoing outreach ministry without overwhelming its resources of finances and energy? How can we involve members who have the time to contribute as well as those who would rather make a financial contribution? For example, St. Alban's vestry is inviting Vicksburg's and Port Gibson's Episcopal churches and all of Bovina churches to a meeting to explore funding to construct a new Habitat house. Habitat for Humanity already has the \$35,000 needed for materials in hand. What is left is a way to build. The donations of \$30,000 in cash or of "in kind" labor by qualified workers is needed to complete the construction.

On a smaller scale, in May we are focusing on collecting funds for *Nets for Life*. *Nets for Life* works to eliminate malaria in some of the most remote areas of sub-Saharan Africa by providing life-saving prevention training and long-lasting insecticide-treated nets. A donation of \$12 provides one net. Through May 25, we have the opportunity to make our dollars go even further. During this period, any

donation made to the *Nets for Life Inspiration Fund* will be matched dollar-for-dollar thanks to a group of Episcopal Relief & Development donors.

Also in May, St. Alban's will host a Sit and Knit (or Crochet) day to make scarves and hats for the *Christmas on the River* program. Join us on May 5 from 9 a.m. to noon as we knit or crochet and visit. Patterns suitable for beginners will be available. *Christmas on the River* is the inland waterways counterpart to *Christmas at Sea*, and it's implemented by Seaman's Church Institute's river chaplains. Scarves and hats are included in boxes presented to merchant marines each Christmas.

Acting as the vestry's Outreach Committee, Terry Brantley, Ann Tompkins and Kenon Ruska will be organizing a monthly "Collection Sunday" to meet a specific need for several other groups, such as school supplies in late summer and other items for the *Christmas on the River* program in the fall. We want to begin making a presentation on the Second Sunday for a "charity of the month." A list of groups that we have been made aware of is listed below. Vestry Mutual Ministry Review

The vestry participated in a diocesan Mutual Ministry Review (MMR) during April administered by the Reverend Canon David Johnson. The review was a "360-degree" format where lay leaders and clergy review each other and themselves in all elements of their roles as church leaders. This was the first MMR by the St. Alban's vestry and clergy. The process will be repeated again in three years.

The review probed forty-six key areas to reflect on the desire to accomplish God's will for the parish and to seek improvement in the parish ministries and how they are offered. The review also sought to understanding of parish ministry as mutually shared. This included the responsibility of both the laity and clergy. The review was not an attempt to place blame for any past shortcomings. The anonymous questionnaire was completed on-line and evaluated by Canon Johnson.

On April 24th, Canon Johnson met with the vestry to discuss the review results. In general, the vestry exhibited a strong knowledge of the church's mission, administration and responsibilities. Weaknesses and successes were probed and discussed. The MMR placed emphasis on celebrating our successes as well as identifying our challenges. The results will provide the clergy and laity with a roadmap for establishing our goals and prioritizing resources.



St. Alban's Letterbox

Letterboxing is a hide-and-seek type game played in Great Britain, the United States and much the rest of the world. Letterboxers hide small, weatherproof boxes holding a logbook and a rubber stamp in publicly-accessible places and distribute clues to find the box on several web sites. Seekers have their own logbook and rubber stamp. When a box is found, the logbooks are cross-stamped as proof that the hidden box has been found and the box replaced for the next finder. Letterboxers can also register their find on-line and leave a message for the box owners.

St. Alban's has a letterbox hidden in the cemetery. Karen McGraw created our stamp from a photograph of the Rose Window. Kenon and Karen have hidden a letterbox under a log and leaves near a cedar stump under a large cedar tree. Several letterboxers have found our letterbox and left messages indicating their appreciation of the beauty of St. Alban's. Last year a traveler from Michigan visited St. Alban's to find the box. The box was last found on January 31.

Letterboxing originated in Dartmoor, Devon, England, when a Dartmoor guide placed a bottle for visitors' cards at Cranmere Pool on the northern moor in 1854. From this, hikers on the moors began to leave a letter or postcard inside a box along the trail—hence the name "letterboxing." The next person to discover the site would collect the postcards and mail them. Interest in letterboxing in the United States is generally considered to have started with a feature article in the Smithsonian Magazine in April 1998. Clues to American letterboxes are commonly published on several different websites.

This year our Parish Weekend was planned for the weekend after Easter. A look back on the commitments we completed during the past four months included—Annual Council, Lenten Art's Programs and Soup Dinners, The Bishop's Visitation, Holy Week Services and Easter—not to mention the routine demands of our daily lives. The winter and spring months were overflowing with new opportunities for creativity and demands of our "to do lists." Could this describe how God felt on the seventh day when He completed the work of creation? We don't know the answer to that question but we do know that God rested.

The rhythm of work and Sabbath is essential for the well being of each of us—individually and as a community. The Parish Weekend offered a Sabbath after a long stretch of work. Our time at *The Big House* was loosely scheduled. We gathered for meals and prayers at designated times. Other than that, we were free to simply rest. Rest came in a variety of ways. Some folks (Terry Guynes) fished from pre-dawn to post-dusk. Some folks walked. Some folks biked. Some folks napped. Before the weekend ended, everyone gathered on the screened-in porch to rock and to visit. For me, the experience of porch time was reminiscent of evenings spent on the porches of my grandparent's house. I recall neighbors drifting back and forth from porch to porch, visiting and catching up on the latest news.

The highlight of the weekend was the celebration of the Eucharist around the dining room table in *The Big House*, followed by the fish fry, catered by Charlie and Terry Brantley. Our weekend crowd expanded with the arrival of additional St. Alban's folks who came over for the day. No one marked our time. No deadlines. No rush. The spirit of Sabbath descended upon us. Sabbath was easy. *The Big House* offered hospitality, the weather was perfect, the lake was glistening with the reflection of the sunlight, the fish were biting, the food was abundant and the company was enjoyable.

St. Alban's outreach in April and May is *Nets for Life*. This program is designed to send mosquito nets to Africa to combat the death rate of 3,000 children per day who die from malaria. To date we have collected \$800.00. Way to Go!!!!! The Episcopal Relief and Development will match donations dollar for dollar through the month of May. It is not too late to contribute. Checks may be made payable to St. Alban's with "NETS" on the note line. Cash is also okay. Nets are \$12.00, but any amount can be donated. I will report the final total at the end of May.

Each week following Sunday service I recycle the bulletin inserts and deliver them to the Warren County Jail. I recycle old *Forward Day by Day* booklets, put a St. Alban's label on them and leave them in waiting rooms when I have appointments that require a wait time.
