


Visiting St. Mary's Chapel at Laurel Hill Plantation

St. Mary's Chapel, a Gothic Revival architectural jewel, is one of the oldest churches in the diocese. It was built in 1839 by Dr. William Newton Mercer, owner of Laurel Hill Plantation, and used as a private chapel by family members. The miniature chapel was consecrated in 1839 by Rev. James Otey, a frontier Episcopal bishop serving Mississippi. Sadly, the chapel was only used for eleven years before becoming inactive. Tragic deaths in the family most likely contributed to the decline. The church has remained consecrated for the past 177 years.






Interior of St. Mary's Chapel

Christ Church: "Cradle of Episcopacy in Mississippi"


Christ Church, located north of Natchez, is recognized as the *Cradle of Episcopacy in Mississippi.* The first *Christ Church* was built circa 1820— thirty years before Rev. William Mercer Green was consecrated as the first bishop of the Diocese of Mississippi. Time erased the first and second churches but the current *Christ Church,* built 1857-1858, remains an exquisite example of Gothic Revival architecture.

Reverend Billie Leaves for Sabbatical

Sunday, April 17th, Rev. Billie delivered her final homily before embarking on a ten-week sabbatical that would take her to the rural monastery of *The Society of Saint John the Evangelist,* West Newbury, Massachusetts, and their urban monastery in Cambridge. After the retreat, her plans are to visit Deer Island, Maine—New York City—Grayton Beach, Florida, and finally back to her home near Enid Lake before returning to St. Albans on July 3rd.

During her final days in Bovina, Rev. Billie was excited and looking forward to the sabbatical— the first few weeks to be spent at the monasteries in Massachusetts followed by a visit to Deer Island, a picturesque tourist destination off the coast of



Maine. She also plans to spend time with family—visiting her daughter and son-in-law in New York City before returning home for her grandson's high school graduation. In May, she will meet with the family for their annual vacation on the sandy beaches of Florida before returning to her new cottage, *Gratitude*, located near the shores of Enid Lake.

During the April 17th Eucharist, the congregation recited Psalm 23—scripture that would become the backdrop for Rev. Billie's morning homily, "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul…." After serving as deacon of St. Alban's Church since 2008, the time had finally come for Rev. Billie to rest—*to lie down in green pastures and restore her soul* —the time had come to slow down and enjoy *being* instead of *doing*.

Perhaps Mother Teresa said it best when she wrote of the need for quiet time and prayer in our lives: We are called to withdraw at certain intervals into deeper silence and aloneness with God... to be alone with Him — not with our books, thoughts, and memories but completely stripped of everything... In silence, we will find new energy and true unity.

May the road rise to meet you, May the wind be always at your back, May the sun shine warm upon your face, The rains fall soft upon your fields and, Until we meet again, May God hold you in the palm of His hand.

St. Alban's Welcomes Reverend Hugh Jones



On Sunday April 24, Rev. Hugh Jones began a two-month ministry as supply priest during Reverend Billie's absence. An eager and appreciative congregation greeted him for his first sermon to the St. Alban's Community.

Rev. Jones felt quite at home at St. Alban's, Bovina, since the last church he served before retiring in 2008 was St. Alban's Church in Hixson, Tennessee. Ironically, their church newsletter was also named *The Albanac*. During the Eucharist, he was introduced to a sound different from that of any of the other churches he has served—a train blowing its horn while rumbling along the tracks only a few feet from St. Alban's.

During the sermon, Rev. Jones gave a brief sketch of his life and his ministry: "I was born in 1948 and grew up on the New Jersey side of metropolitan New York City. After moving south, I attended Sewanee for three semesters before transferring to and graduating from Millsaps College. I returned to Sewanee for seminary (1973-1976) and was ordained deacon that same year at the Cathedral in Jackson. Afterwards, I served as the Curate at St. John's Church, Laurel, Mississippi, for two

years and was ordained priest at the end of the first year. While in the Diocese of Mississippi, I served on the Executive Committee and directed camps at Bratton-Green. From 1978 until 1985, I served as Chaplain at Mississippi State while earning a doctorate in counseling."

Rev. Jones retired in 2008 after a ministry that spanned over three decades. However, for seven years, he continued to serve as interim rector of various parishes In 2014, he moved to Ridgeland and made his home at *The Breakers* on the Ross Barnett Reservoir.

Reverend Jones has three grown children: Ben, a biologist on the staff of the Tennessee Aquarium in Chattanooga; Abram, a seminarian at the Seminary of the Southwest in Austin; and Mary who lives at Fort Hood, Killeen, Texas. All three are married—Abram and Mary and their spouses have one child each and Ben and his wife are expecting their first child in June.

The community of St. Alban's welcomes Rev. Jones in our midst and looks forward to his spiritual guidance in the weeks to come.
