

The Lawn Labyrinth
Saint Mary's Abbey, West Malling, England

A labyrinth is a spiritual journey – a pilgrimage to a sacred site. The sacred site is the center of the labyrinth where pilgrims can encounter the holy within themselves. A labyrinth provides a path for walking in prayer – with words or in the silence of our hearts. Our whole bodies pray as we slowly move in and around the circuitous route.

For centuries, pilgrims have been traveling to sacred destinations seeking healing or self-knowledge or answers to questions. In the end, all pilgrims are seeking to satisfy a longing for God.

The summer after I graduated from seminary, I made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land by way of stops in England, France and Italy. While in England I made a retreat with the Order of Anglican Benedictine Nuns at the St. Mary's Abbey in West Malling. One evening after Compline, when the sisters and the guests had settled into their cells, I decided to take a stroll around the grounds. I noticed a labyrinth that was cut into the deep grass that covered the lawn. I took off my shoes before I entered the labyrinth so that I could feel the earth beneath my feet as I walked.

I don't recall what I was thinking as I slowly entered the labyrinth – what I clearly remember was the awareness of being connected to the earth as stepped on the cool grass pathway. A sudden sensation came over me – it was a chill that went through my body that had something to do with forgiveness. I was conscious of being forgiven and forgiving. I was stunned. I sensed a freedom erupting from the depths of my being. It was physical. It was spiritual. I had walked, barefooted, into God's grace.

I've walked the labyrinth many times since, but nothing like such a sensation of forgiveness has ever occurred again. It was most likely a once in a lifetime treasure.

Gray Conference Center has recently installed a labyrinth that is located outside of the chapel. Take the opportunity to walk this labyrinth the next time you are at Gray Center. Simply enter the path with a curious heart – follow the pathway as it meanders around to the center and back out. Make a pilgrimage – let your body pray the journey into the sacred. Expect the unexpected.



THE GREAT FIFTY DAYS OF EASTER





Eagle Scout Project

Beyond Walls Homeless Shelter

On April 22nd, I completed my Eagle Scout project. If you are not familiar with Boy Scouts, Eagle Scout is the highest rank a Boy Scout can earn. One of the requirements to obtain the Eagle Scout rank is to complete a community service project that the Scout plans, obtains funding, and recruits and supervises volunteers.

For my project, I renovated the interiors of the kitchen areas at the *Beyond Walls* homeless shelter in Vicksburg. Approximately 15 men prepared food in kitchens with rotted and moldy walls and ceilings, as shown in the accompanying photographs. While

I couldn't help these homeless people find new jobs or homes of their own, I thought it was important that they at least have a decent place to use for meals.



Before I could begin working in the house with other Scouts and volunteers, the moldy drywall was removed by AmeriCorps NCCC volunteers who were trained in removing water damaged interiors and mold remediation during projects in Florida following Hurricane Irma.

After the damaged walls and ceilings were removed, it was discovered that the wiring for the lighting was not safe and was a fire hazard. The shelter is a house that is over 100 years-old and one of the volunteers who is licensed for





electrical work said that the wiring was well over 50 years-old. While the wiring was not part of the original plan, it was necessary to make the house safe, so the work was done.

Another surprise behind the old drywall and plaster was that some walls were concrete underneath, not wood-framed. This required a different technique to install the new drywall. Also, where there were wood frames in the walls and ceilings, more of the supports were rotted and needed to be replaced than expected. Fortunately, because of the support of St. Alban's and other donors, all of the bad boards were replaced and the new walls, ceilings and lights and new door should provide the shelter residents with a safe and decent place to prepare their meals. These additional

photographs show the condition of the kitchens after the project was completed.

The residents at the shelter are going to complete the sanding and will paint the new walls and interiors. The residents were very grateful for the work that made the shelter more livable as they work to rebuild their lives.

I really appreciate the support of St. Alban's *Outreach Missions* donation in allowing me to make their lives a little better and to show them that there were people who cared about them when they are usually ignored.
