Fall Festival and Dinner on the Grounds Saturday, October 25th-Book Dedication Sunday, October 26th-Dinner on the Grounds & Country Market



Once again, St. Alban's is preparing to celebrate the annual *Fall Festival* that will take place the weekend of October 25-26. For decades, church members have enjoyed welcoming friends and guests to share in the long-time tradition of *Dinner on the Grounds* after Sunday services. The tradition began as early as Thursday, May 5, 1859, when Bishop William Mercer Green, assisted by Rev. James Fox, Rev. Henry Sansom and Rev. William Crane, consecrated St. Alban's Church. It was a lengthy service – one that included the confirmation of twenty individuals. Afterwards, the congregation enjoyed *Dinner on the Grounds*. Bishop Green wrote of that special day in his journal: *At the close of the protracted services, a plentiful collation was enjoyed under the beautiful and wide-spreading beech trees adjoining the Church*.

This year's Fall Festival will begin on Saturday morning, 10:30 AM with the dedication of Owl Roost Plantation: The Civil War Letters of Samuel and Caroline Townsend,

edited by Rebecca Drake. Mary Ruth Jones, Edward Shelnut and James Anderson will read the newly discovered letters written by Samuel and Caroline Townsend, charter members of St. Alban's Church in 1857. Also performing for the dedication will be the *Lewis Family Singers* from Bolton who will sing *Amazing Grace* and *I'll Fly Away*. Following the dedication, a reception and book signing will be held in the Parish House.

On Sunday following the 11:00 Holy Eucharist, everyone will gather in the *grove* for *Dinner on the Grounds*. Also taking place will be the traditional *Country Market*. Plan to purchase a meal ticket and invite friends to join us for the annual fundraising event.

On the morning of Saturday, September 25, at 10:30, Becky Drake's latest book, Owl Roost Plantation, Bovina, Mississippi: The Civil War Letters of Samuel & Caroline Townsend, will be dedicated. The dedication will include readings from Owl Roost presented by thespians Mary Ruth Jones, Edward Shelnut and James Anderson. Music will fill the nave with the voices of the Lewis Family Singers, a Gospel group associated with the Champion Hill Missionary Baptist Church, Bolton.

Following the dedication, a book signing and reception will take place in the Parish House. Becky will be available to personally inscribe books. The reception table will be overflowing with delectables.

During the weekend of activities, there will be an Art and Family Bible Exhibit in the Parish House. St. Alban's visual artists-Wanda Warren, Ann Jones, Del Price, Butch Mitchell, Jim Drake and Jerry McWilliams-will have their art on display. Also featured in the Parish House Exhibit will be the Family Bibles of church members.

Sunday will begin with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist followed by *Dinner* on the Grounds and The Country Market. Music provided by the Angel Bandits, a Bluegrass string group, will be the backdrop as people enjoy their lunch under the shade of the live Oak Trees. The menu will be fried catfish and hushpuppies, our famous slaw, homemade tartar sauce, green beans and brownies. SELL TICKETS!!! Tickets are \$10.00.

The ECW *Country Market* is a marketplace for stocking up on delicious dishes to serve at home. With the help of Tommy Skinner, the ECW prepares baked goods, frozen casseroles and soups, as well as pickles and jelly to sell.



Fall Festival Family Bible Display




Bibles contain the sacred word of God. Holy Scripture is the centerpiece of our faith. The stories of the Bible, from Genesis to Revelation, tell the history of our ancestors in faith. They are a common link we share in our faith journey. Bibles play another important role in our lives—they record our biblical ancestors as well as our personal family linage.

Most of us have at least one Family Bible that has been handed down from one generation to the next. Frequently, Bibles act as a family tree with recorded names, dates and events that are significant to the history of the family. One reason we can share our genealogy with others is because the names and dates of our ancestors have been preserved in the Family Bibles. The Bibles are treasures that evoke memories and maintain history. Viewing a collection of Family Bibles creates a sense of appreciation and respect for the family members who took the time to record history that might otherwise have been lost.

As part of our *Fall Festival Weekend*, Family Bibles will be displayed in the Parish House. You are invited to bring your Family Bible to be part of the exhibition. Signs will give whatever information you wish to be included. For example, the earliest date I found in one of my Family Bibles was 1930. The Bible was given to my father as a gift for the work that he did for a revival at his home church, the First Christian Church of Paris, Tennessee. The latest date I found in one of the Bibles was 1963—it was a gift to my sister on her tenth birthday.

Your Bible may have handwritten notes in the margins of the pages or underlined favorite verses. Or it may be the repository for prized photographs, dried flowers, church certificates or greeting cards. Signs will indicate whether or not the Bibles may be touched. If you are concerned about the fragile condition of your Bible, a sign can be made that states—*Please Not Do Touch*. Be assured that your Bibles will be treated with the respect they deserve.

Share your family treasure with others. Invite others into your sacred history. Your Family Bible is a window into the common life we share in our family sized church.

In 2011, during the Service for The Ordination of a Deacon, Bishop Gray addressed the ordinands saying: As a deacon in the Church, you are to study the Holy Scriptures, to seek nourishment from them, and to model your life upon them.

I have attempted to do this through my work at the Warren County Youth Court as a court appointed guardian ad litem (GAL). Currently, I am working with fifteen children and their parents. Some families have multiple children. My goal is to determine what is best for the child and present my findings to the court.

I conduct home and school visits, talking with parents and teachers and looking for ways to help parents and children communicate. This way issues can be dealt with before happening again. I review medical records, mental health evaluations and school records. The length of time a case is open depends on the severity of the allegation. Every opportunity is given so the parent and child can be



reunited. Sadly this does not always occur. In extreme cases, a parent's rights are terminated and the child is placed for adoption.

Counseling is a major component of the reunification process. Some parents refuse or do not complete counseling sessions. Drug testing for parents with addictions is required and some refuse testing. This makes it impossible to negotiate on behalf of the child.

My happiest moments are when children return to their parents. My saddest moments are when the rights of the parents are terminated. I have experienced both this year. One of my "children" who was returned to his father enrolled in first grade. When I saw the father and his family with the child, they thanked me for my efforts.

Parents whose rights have been terminated are unhappy and I understand that, but the safety of the child must come before the parent's right to use drugs. I ask your continued prayers as my ministry to helpless children continues in the Youth Court.
