Dinner on the Grounds A One Hundred Sixty-Three-Year Tradition Continues



On May 5, 1859, William Mercer Green, Mississippi's first Episcopal bishop, visited Bovina to consecrate St. Alban's Church. He later wrote of the consecration in his journal: "At the close of the protracted services, a plentiful collation [light meal] was enjoyed under the beautiful and wide-spreading beech-trees adjoining the Church." Through the years, St. Alban's has continued the wonderful tradition of *Dinner on the Grounds* where church members and friends gather to share food and fellowship."









Vestry Nominations

At the 2023 Annual Meeting, scheduled for January 22, we have two members rotating off the vestry: our Junior Warden, David May and Herb Jones. We will be electing a new Junior Warden to serve a 2-year term and a new member to serve a 3-year term.

St. Alban's has a small vestry with a big mission: spiritual and temporal leadership of the church. Our vestry is very much a working vestry. Vestry members help pitch in to do the work that larger churches have paid staff to do. Vestry members also look out for the wellbeing of the congregation and listen for how the Holy Spirit might be calling the church into the future.

Requirements to serve as a member of the vestry are contained in our church by-laws. Lay members of the parish in good standing who are confirmed communicants, at least 21 years old, canonically resident in the parish and entitled to suffrage at the annual meeting are eligible to serve on the vestry. "In good standing" means that the member attends services regularly at St. Alban's and gives of their time, talent, and treasure to the church. Employees of the church are not eligible to serve on vestry. In addition, here are some of the expectations of those serving on the vestry:

- Spiritual maturity with a desire to deepen your service to the church
- Consistent preparation for and attendance at meetings (currently held the third Thursday of each month at 6:00 PM)
- Faithful attendance at worship and participation in other activities at the church, especially major church events
- Healthy patterns of communication, including willingness to listen to parishioners' concerns, and problem-solving spirit
- Willingness to check email and learn how to use Zoom, which we use to conduct some vestry business
- Availability for an orientation to the vestry and for regular service as "vestry person of the day" at church services

The Nominations Committee will be meeting in November. If you would like to nominate yourself or someone else (with their permission), please contact Senior Warden Penny Freund or Rev. Elisabeth. Nominations are also allowed from the floor at the Annual Meeting.

Advent starts the last Sunday of November, and in addition to fun activities, like making Advent wreaths, we're also going to focus on outreach to our community. At Christmas the past few years, St. Alban's has supported the families at *Lifting Lives Family Shelter*, by providing Christmas gifts for the children and household necessities for the adults. Just like last year, you will be invited to donate toys and other gifts for the children. Walking the Mourner's Path

Walking the Mourner's Path is a program designed to help those who are experiencing the stages of grief. Through a series of meetings, participants learn to recognize where they are in the grieving process and how to regain their sense of purpose and joy in God's creation and in the people around them. Facilitators Stacy Weaver and Betsy Selby work with the Rev. Elisabeth Malphurs to guide participants through each session.

St. Alban's will begin a new set of workshops in January, the exact dates will be announced soon. If you are grieving for someone you loved who has passed away, these workshops may be helpful. Grief does not go away, but it's possible to work through it.

Walking the Mourner's Path is Christian-based and incorporates prayer, the sacraments, and scripture. Meetings are held in the same place and at the same time for eight consecutive weeks and each person is expected to be present for all the meetings for the hour and a half session time. Those who sign up will be asked to share their stories and experiences, and everyone is expected to respect the confidentiality of each person in the group.



Weeds: Plants that grows where they are not wanted



First, allow me to make this disclaimer: I am NOT a gardener but I do enjoy attractive flowers, bushes, and all of the things God planted on the earth. Thankfully, we live in an area where these are plentiful and easy to grow.

When I lived in Texas, our yard would not grow grass since there was a large amount of clay in the soil. Out of frustration, I discussed the problem with a church friend who was a botany professor at Texas Woman's University. She said there might be a type of grass that would grow there, but better than that, perhaps I could plant native ground covers and other native plants. She referred me to a man who owned The Wild Bird Store and was also a landscape architect.

The man came to our yard, took samples of the soil and wrote a couple of plans I could work with. Each one described the location in my yard where I should plant certain kinds of plants. He also said he was pleased to help me figure this out because if I planted native plants, it would attract native bird, butterflies and insects.

The following weekend I went to a nursery and bought a few plants to get started. As I said, I am not a gardener and I didn't want to be overzealous about planting, only to find out I did it wrong and have to watch the plants die. I discovered that wherever you live you will be much better off planting native plants. They grow better in the right climate and would attract a bounty of wildlife that are beautiful to observe.

Another thing I learned from the botany professor was a positive philosophy about weeds. We were discussing that I had seen beautiful plants growing alongside the highways, but I was told they were weeds. She responded, "a weed is a plant that grows where it is not wanted." This doesn't mean the plants are not beautiful. Visualize the lilies of the field – and the wild violets and wood-sorrel that blanket the earth.

In *The Garden of Life*, everyone and everything has a place in God's world. He did not make any of us 'likened unto weeds'—He made us in His own image...and saw everything He had made, and indeed it was very Good.

Elisabeth's Epistle

People Look East

One of my favorite newer Advent hymns is "People Look East" by Eleanor Farjeon. Here's the first verse:

People, look east. The time is near Of the crowning of the year. Make your house fair as you are able, Trim the hearth and set the table. People, look east and sing today: Love, the guest, is on the way.

Advent is one of my favorite church seasons, and this hymn captures the expectancy of Advent, as we wait not only to celebrate the joy of the Incarnation, but also for God to continue the renewal of the world begun in Jesus Christ. Why look east? East has long been the direction for prayer in the Judeo-Christian tradition. For Jewish people scattered abroad, turning toward Jerusalem most often meant facing east. For Christians looking for Christ's coming again, the associations with both Jerusalem and the rising sun also pointed toward an eastward direction for prayer. You will see graves, in Jerusalem, but also in our own cemetery, oriented toward the east, as if waiting expectantly. I love celebrating our first service on Easter morning at the outdoor chapel, which faces east, looking out over the cemetery toward the rising sun.

St. Alban's has another way in which we "look east" together with a sense of expectancy. We worship at what is referred to as an "east-facing altar." Technically, the altar in the church is not oriented toward the east, but symbolically, the fact that we all face the same direction during the Eucharistic prayer, makes it an "east-facing altar." It is not as common these days to see the priest turn his or her back to the people during the Eucharistic prayer, and so it is worth noting the beauty and symbolism in this position. After I finish the *Sursum Corda*, or opening greeting of the Eucharistic prayer, I turn toward the altar and we all look "east" together. This is the moment when I feel the communion of saints gathered around us at the altar, joining us in our expectant waiting. We join our prayers together with the prayers of all the saints and the heavenly hosts as we wait for God to continue the work of redeeming creation.
