

Construction is really moving quickly on our remodel and addition in *Sessions Hall!* Exterior brickwork is complete on new part of the building and the cabinets and trim are almost finished. The next steps include more plumbing work, some electrical work, then paint, flooring and finish work. Waterproofing and tracking down leaks in all buildings are both on-going. The high-contrast exterior brick on *Sessions Hall* will be painted and waterproofing around the foundation of *Sessions Hall* will also be completed in next two months. The outside area between new classrooms and old part of the building will have gravel installed for drainage and a covered walkway constructed between the emergency exit door in nursery and the new storage room behind the sacristy.


We are soliciting bids to completely rework the driveway by replacing broken culverts, restoring proper drainage and adding a crown to the driveway itself. The flower beds will be cleared out for the foundation work and to drain away from the building. These beds will need new plantings compatible with the areas, The flower bed area between doors to the church and parish hall will be changed to sod. We will have the door open to *Sessions Hall* on Sundays so everyone who wants can have a chance to walk around inside the new space. We will have much to celebrate in October with moving into our completed building, dedication of plaques for the Outdoor Chapel and the Memorial Garden and Dinner of the Grounds!

I like to say that we're all works in progress. Myself included. God is always working with us and on us to help us grow more fully into the stature of Christ. As it happens, I'm also in priest in progress. In the Episcopal Church, we call priests in progress "transitional deacons." It's an odd title, to be sure, and I've already heard many of you just go ahead and refer to me as your priest or your "future priest." But this stage that I'm in, this transitional stage, the period of my diaconate, is important. And not just for me, but for all of us as a community. We are learning how to be together, and you are shaping me as an ordained person. This period of preparation is critical. But it also comes with plenty of questions...


So just what IS a transitional deacon? Deacons are first and foremost ministers, just like lay people, priests, and bishops are all ministers; that is, all called to represent Christ and his church. Some people, like Deacon Josie, are called to the diaconate, which is a ministry focused particularly on those in need, bridging the church and the needs of the world. I have been called to the priesthood, a ministry of preaching, teaching, pastoring, and administering the sacraments. However, in the Episcopal Church, no one is ordained directly to the priesthood. Our belief is that priests must first be ordained to the diaconate, into the ministry of servanthood that Jesus modeled for us. Every priest has first served for at least six months, and sometimes longer, as a deacon. (For more information about the ministry of the laity, deacons, priests and bishops, look in your Book of Common Prayer on pages 855-6.)

Why does it seem like our services are different each Sunday? You may have noticed that our services have varied a lot since I arrived! This has to do with the kinds of services that deacons are permitted to lead. When we have an assisting priest, we have been celebrating Holy Eucharist. Bishop Seage allows me to preside at a service of Communion from the Reserved Sacrament twice a month on Sundays. In a service of Communion from the Reserved Sacrament, the bread and wine have already been consecrated at a service of Holy Eucharist, so you will notice that we do not say all of the Eucharistic prayers, but instead say only the Lord's Prayer. At other times, we hold Morning Prayer, a service that can be officiated by a lay person or deacon.

But I've noticed some other differences! You may also have noticed some slight differences between the way I lead worship and what you are used to seeing a priest do. That's because deacons and priests have different functions in the liturgy.

• After confession, you will notice that I use a form of declaring the forgiveness of sins that can be used by deacons and lay people because it includes "us" and "our." When we have a priest with us, you will notice the traditional absolution of sins.

- After the postcommunion prayer, you will notice that I do not pronounce a blessing, which is also the role of a priest.
- Another difference you may have noticed is in the way deacons and priests wear their stoles. Deacons wear the stole across the body, and priests wear the stole hanging on either side.



There is a prayer by the Jesuit Teilhard de Chardin that seems perfect for this stage in my life and the life of our parish. It is all about being patient with ourselves during liminal times, those times of transition that we all go through:

> Above all, trust in the slow work of God. We are quite naturally impatient in everything to reach the end without delay. We should like to skip the intermediate stages. We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new. And yet it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability and that it may take a very long time. And so I think it is with you; your ideas mature gradually—let them grow, let them shape themselves, without undue haste. Don't try to force them on, as though you could be today what time (that is to say, grace and circumstances acting on your own good will) will make of you tomorrow. Only God could say what this new spirit gradually forming within you will be. *Give Our Lord the benefit of believing* that his hand is leading you, and accept the anxiety of feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete.

May we all trust that this in-between time can be a time of tremendous growth for us as a community if we have faith that God's work is unfolding at just the right speed.

St. A Iban's Antique Baptismal Font

In April of 1886, the *Vicksburg Evening Post* featured an article with the headline, EASTER SERVICES AT BOVINA. The correspondent wrote, "A number of citizens of Vicksburg attended services at Bovina yesterday, and St. Alban's Church was largely attended. In addition to the usual Easter ceremonies, the church was

presented a handsome window in memory of Rev. Mr. Fox, its late rector, and a baptismal font as a memorial to Mrs. Col. Hebron who, during her life, was one of the most zealous members of the congregation. The services are said to have been unusually interesting." The article was in reference to St. Alban's second church that was built in 1870 and consecrated in 1880.


Almost a half a century later, the baptismal font and St. Paul's stained glass window were moved to the nave of the 1928 church. Both memorials feature engraved dedications—the window given by St. Alban's congregation in memory of Rev. James A. Fox and the baptismal font given by the children of Mrs. A. [Adaline] L. Hebron. As the years went by, everyone remembered Rev. James A. Fox but few remembered the identity of Mrs. A. L. Hebron.

Determined to find more information about Mrs. Hebron, I sought help from Sue Burns Moore, a

distinguished researcher from Longview, Texas, with deep ties to Mississippi. She sent information not only regarding the life of A. L. [Adaline] Hebron but also the entire Hebron family. And, what a story her research had to tell!


In 1842, Adaline, age 20, married John L Hebron, a widower with five children ranging in age from one to thirteen. John was well known in Warren County for his spacious plantation named *LaGrange*. The 1,200 acre plantation was located near Bovina and the Big Black River. The vast acreage produced not only cotton but also fruit trees—peaches, pears and apples. Prior to the war, *LaGrange Nursery* was noted as one of the largest fruit orchards in the South and the largest pear orchard in the world. The produce was shipped to major cities around the U.S. such as New York, Baltimore and New Orleans.

In April of 1858, Adaline and John were confirmed at St. Alban's by Bishop William M. Green. Early on, Adaline became a devoted member of St. Alban's. John— not so much! He built a small chapel on the plantation grounds where family members could



hold church services rather than make the long carriage ride to St. Alban's, approximately ten miles from *LaGrange*. In all, Adeline was "mother" to thirteen boys and girls of varying ages.

After her husband's death in 1862, age 60, Adaline remained at *LaGrange*, now managed by his firstborn son and namesake, Dr. John L. Hebron. During the *Siege* of Vicksburg, Dr. Hebron treated patients in the Vicksburg Hospital as well as in the field near Bovina. His wife, Ellen Ellington Hebron, was a prominent writer and after



the war was recognized as the "Poet of the Confederacy."

In 1863, when Grant's army began their approach to Vicksburg, one of the first places they invaded was *LaGrange*. Two-thousand, five-hundred Union soldiers camped on the grounds while General Grant took *LaGrange* as temporary headquarters. In one of Ellen Hebron's books, she described General Grant's kindness to her mother-in-law by allowing Adaline and the younger children to live in two of the upstairs bedrooms. However, before the siege was over, the soldiers destroyed the orchard and the family was left destitute.

When Adaline passed away in 1874, age 52, she was buried in the family cemetery at *LaGrange*. However, her children made sure that a memorial stone was placed in St. Alban's Cemetery. The stone simply read, *"MOTHER."*

So, in the words of Paul Harvey, "Now you know the rest of the story." Adaline was a wealthy planter's wife - one of the earliest members of St. Alban's Church - and the mother of thirteen children. She was a strong woman who suffered great loss and despair. Yet, she



embraced love and joy. Her legacy was her influential role as a MOTHER— and her faithful devotion to St. Alban's Church.

Come come ye Saints, We'll find the place which God for us prepared, In His house full of light.... All is well. All is well.
