

# October Book Dedication Planned

Owl Roost: The Civil War Letters of Samuel and Caroline

Townsend will be dedicated by Rebecca Drake on Saturday, October 25, 10:30 a.m. at St. Alban's.

The central characters in the book are Samuel and Caroline Townsend, charter members of St. Alban's, and their daughters, Matilda and Louisa, whose lives were forever changed during and after the Siege of Vicksburg.

Small oval pictures of Samuel and Caroline have hung in the church hallway for decades—Samuel, a handsome young man with

dark features and blue-green eyes and Caroline, a young wife and mother with golden braided hair. Over the years, the photographs have been

admired by church members but none had an *inkling* of the tragedy that befell the family soon after the pictures were taken.

In 2012, after Caroline and Samuel's pictures were featured in *Lift High the Cross: The History of St. Alban's Episcopal Church,* several ancestors wrote requesting copies. In return, the family offered to share five letters written during the War by Samuel, Caroline and her father in Connecticut. It was an exciting day when the letters arrived and, for the first time the fate of the lovely people in the photographs was unveiled.

Realizing the historic value of the letters, not only as related to St. Alban's but also to Mississippi history, permission was requested to edit and publish the letters in book form. The research for the editing of the letters was two years in the making.

After previewing the book, Sherry Johnson, descendant from Wyoming, commented, "What an exciting thing to happen—and what a wonderful tribute to Samuel and Caroline. This will be the first time the letters have been made public. Thanks to their children, Matilda and Louisa, the torch to preserve St. Alban's was passed on from generation to generation."

In 1927, after Matilda's death, her children bequeathed a large sum of money to St. Alban's to build a new Gothic-styled chapel. A brass plaque in the narthex reads: *This church is erected to the GLORY OF GOD in compliance with the wish of MATILDA TOWNSEND PALMER.* In 1936, Virginia Palmer bequeathed a \$30,000 trust fund to St. Alban's in memory of her mother, Louisa Townsend Palmer. The trust has provided financial stability—past, present and future—for St. Alban's.

## Look Who Moved to Bovina & Found St. Alban's!

The population of Bovina, our tiny community that doesn't even have a stop light, does not greatly fluctuate from year to year. 
Penny Freund

Dale Gibson is a retired entrepreneur in the field of scientific supplies and equipment. Dale's creativity is not limited to science research and inventions. He sees the world with the eyes of an artist and one who seeks God. Dale made a trip to the Holy Land where he had a spiritual experience in the Church of the Multiplication—a tiny chapel in Tabgha on the Sea of Galilee. He had a deep sense of the presence of God. After returning home from his travels, Dale designed a mobile with symbols to visually represent his experience in the Holy Land.

This is not just any mobile—the size alone will grab your attention. Dale designed the mobile to hang from the two-story vaulted ceiling in his living room. The final product is the collaborative work of

an ironsmith and a stained glass artisan.


Dangling from the mobile with well balanced precision are—shells and asteroids mixed with a brass and copper medallion of the sun and the moon representing creation; a miniature Rose Window that invites the viewer to enter the center of the window and go to the center of one's being; a gothic shaped stained glass window that represents church; a butterfly that represents resurrection; flying geese that are the Celtic symbol of the Holy Spirit; and a Mary Cross with a crescent moon intersecting the foot of the

cross—and more, much more.

Creation is the major theme in the mobile. It will be no surprise that Dale's favorite Eucharistic Prayer is C with the words: "At your command all things came to be: the vast expanse of interstellar space, galaxies, suns, the planets in their courses, and this fragile earth, our island home."

When you see the mobile—you'll see Dale and come to know him.

# Liturgical Music Conference

## **4** Josie's Journal

Following ordination, my work as a deacon began! First, I had to submit a *Letter of Agreement* to the vestry for approval. The agreement confirmed: the number of sermons I would preach and the number of Sunday's I would have off; my weekly hours; money the vestry would set aside for my continuing education and that I would serve the church in a non-stipendiary position.



Along with other deacons, I am required to submit a yearly report to the bishop defining my ministry. I also submit all continuing education hours, conferences attended and visits to various churches, including those outside the Diocese of Mississippi. The report is given at St. Alban's Annual Parish Meeting.

All deacons are scheduled for an annual consultation with the bishop. Prior to the visit, an annual physical is required. The bishop discusses a variety of subjects including my ministry, my family and my work with the Warren County Youth Court. He then gives my assignment for the next year. Since my ordination, I have been assigned to St. Alban's and would like for that to continue.

During 2014, continuing education hours include: *Annual Council, Clergy Conference, Anglican Rosary Workshop, Lay Leadership Workshop, Deacon Retreat, Council Reconvened* and the *Music and Liturgy Conference.* The *Deacon Retreat* and *Clergy Conference* are required annual events.

Often I recall the words spoken by Bishop Gray during my ordination... "God now calls you to a special ministry of servanthood directly under your bishop. In the name of Jesus Christ, you are to serve all people, particularly the poor, the weak, the sick, and the lonely..." My ministry as a deacon is not only my mission but also my joy.

Go in Peace to Love and Serve the Lord. Alleluia, Alleluia!
