## Elisabeth Malphurs Appointed Deacon-in-Charge



We are delighted that Bishop Seage announced the appointment of Elisabeth Malphurs as Deacon-in-Charge at St. Alban's Church. Elisabeth will graduate from Virginia Theological Seminary in May 2019 with a Master of Divinity. The Bishop's plans are that she will be ordained to the transitional diaconate in early June 2019 and will begin her ministry at St. Alban's on July 1, 2019. Elisabeth will be ordained to the priesthood in January 2020.

Elisabeth was born and raised in Jackson. She graduated from Davidson College in North Carolina, majoring in religion and received a master's degree

in Social Work from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Elisabeth is a licensed, certified social worker with experience in the areas of community mental health, services for people who are homeless, and domestic violence. She currently serves as seminarian at Christ Church on Capitol Hill, Washington, DC.

She is married to her high school sweetheart, Buck Cooper, and they have two sons, Henry (11) and Andrew (7). Buck is a teacher, currently teaching geometry and physics at the high school level. ## Remembering Sunday School & The Birthday Song

The years 2011-2012 found me deep in research as I began writing, *Lift High the Cross: The History of St. Alban's Church*. My plan was to capture the history in chapters—each chapter chronicling the times and events of years gone by. In order to make the book unique, I chose hymn titles for each chapter, letting the lyrics set the ambiance for the story. In the end, *Lift High the Cross* numbered 30 chapters of memories.

One of my favorite stories is found in Chapter 24—*Children are a Gift from Heaven*—a sweet story of “The Birthday Song” told to me during a phone conversation with Eleanor Scott Price. Eleanor began her Sunday school years at St. Alban's in childhood (circa 1930s) and remained a lifelong member until her death in 2016.

During our phone conversation, she recalled Sunday school at St. Alban's in earlier times. The children and adults would assemble in the nave for prayer and singing before going to their age-appropriate classes. During the general assembly, they also celebrated birthdays with a special arrangement of *The Birthday Song*. I'll never forget Eleanor relating the essence of the Sunday school story—then, before hanging up, sweetly singing *The Birthday Song*.



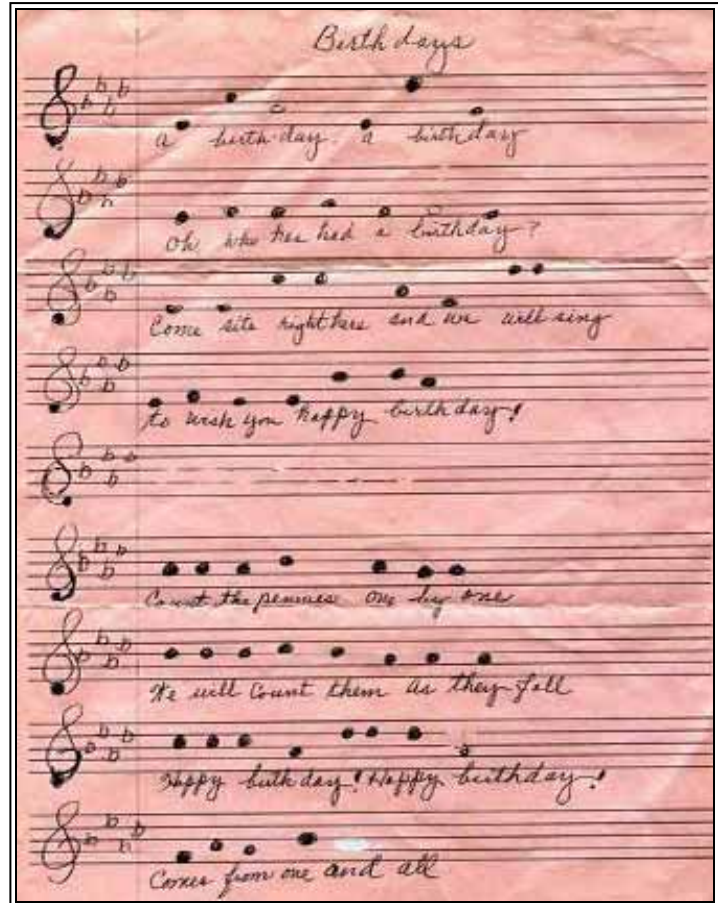

### Children are a Gift from Heaven

“Sunday school was held at ten o'clock and everyone, young and old, would assemble in the nave to share in prayer, scripture and song. One of the favorite hymns sung during the opening service was *Stand Up*,

*Stand Up for Jesus.* The children would squirm with excitement as they waited for the Sunday school superintendent to ask, “Does anyone have a birthday to celebrate?!” Everyone loved that question. If anyone, young or old, had a birthday they went forward and dropped pennies in a collection box while everyone sang exuberantly, *A birthday, a birthday, oh who has had a birthday? Come stand right here and we will sing to wish you Happy Birthday. Drop the pennies one by one – we will count them as they fall. Happy Birthday, Happy Birthday comes from one and all.*

“The number of pennies dropped in the collection box corresponded to the person’s age. That only added to the excitement. To save time, the adults dropped nickels, quarters or dimes in the box. The money collected was added to the Sunday school funds to be used for special project throughout the year.”



A few people in the church remember singing *The Birthday Song*. However, the lyrics and music were lost over time—that is until the first week in January 2019 when Beth Guynes found a folder of old church materials and gave the folder to me to research the contents. One of the first things I found in the folder was a sheet of pink paper where someone had written the lyrics and melody to *The Birthday Song* in the key of A-flat.

Eleanor also recalled that on sunny days, the Sunday school class often met outside under the big oak tree. The children’s voices could be heard singing, *Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tell me so; little ones to Him belong; they are weak but He is strong. Yes, Jesus loves me! Yes, Jesus loves me! Yes Jesus loves me! The Bible tells me so.*

What a beautiful memory—children singing of God’s love for the *little ones*—a love they would forever carry in their hearts.

### *Three Wisdoms*

*"Pace yourself," said the cheetah, "it's a long run."*

*"Hurry Up. Slow Down. Pace Yourself—It's a Long Run."* I first read these words years ago in a book, *The Crossing Point*, by M. C. Richards. I was at a point in my life when I was beginning to realize that I couldn't maintain the hurry up mindset that had driven me since my adolescence. Hurry up had its advantages—it got me through the time in life when my to-do list was overflowing with the worthy goals coming at me in all directions—a college degree, a teaching career, marriage, motherhood, community volunteer, and active church goer. The never ending to-do list that had been my source of energy and motivation finally wore me out. I realized that I had to slow down when I became perpetually frustrated and exhausted with feeling the pressure of time always bearing down on me—always too much to do and not enough time to do it.

There is a big difference between realizing the need to slow down and actually slowing down. Hurry up had been the primary force in my life for a lot of years. My first step in the slow down process was to take off my wrist watch. I put it in the dresser drawer and thought my hurry up instincts were put away too. BUT NO! That is not what happened. I discovered an internal clock that was programed inside of me. I didn't need to look at my watch to see what time it was—I still knew the time and I still knew that I had too much to accomplish. What I discovered was that slowing down was a slow process.

At this point in my life, age 71, I can say that I have spent as many years hurrying up as I have spent in slowing down. And now I realize the value of pacing myself. There will always be times when I have too much to do, and there will always be times when I can slow down and let my soul catch up with me. The difference is a sense of balance—hurry up no longer consumes me—slow down is no longer an effort. The two live in harmony within me, at least most of the time.

For me pacing myself meant finding time each day for quiet. I have observed that a quiet start in the morning infiltrates the rest of the day. I still have plenty to do with the remaining portion of my workday, but now I sense a red flag when any frantic feeling comes over me due to the pressure of time bearing down on me. When that familiar frantic feeling manifests itself, I have learned that a slight pause and several deep breaths can quiet me. I am far more productive when I am not in a state of urgency.

Does my story sound familiar? Has time become your enemy? Take time to cultivate a sense of quiet. Get comfortable with stillness. Practice tranquility. Learn to see with the eyes of your soul and hear with the ears of your heart. *"Pace yourself, it's a long run."*

#### **Session 3 Salvation**

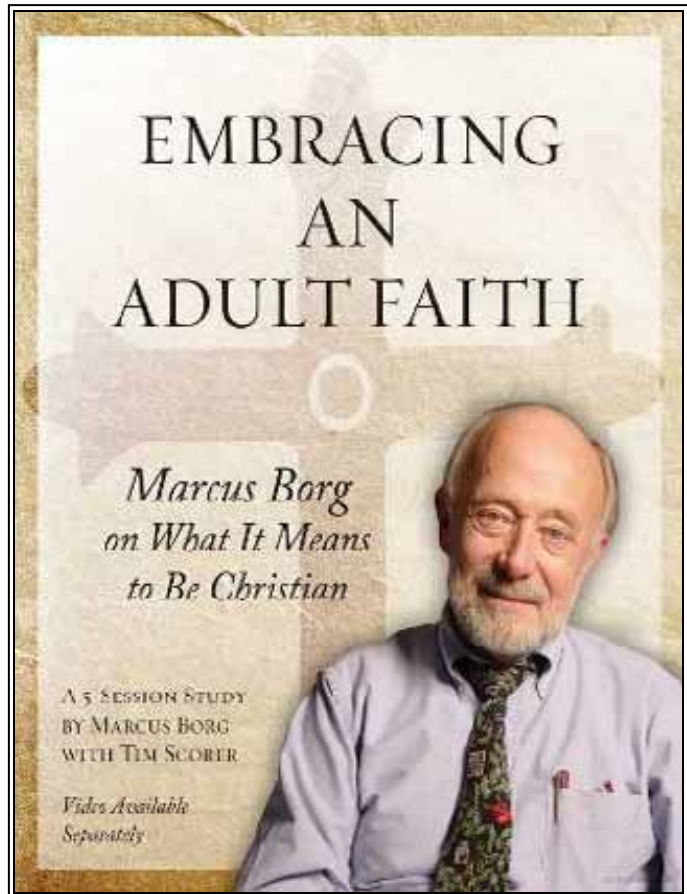
Question: Describe what salvation looks like to you.
