196th Annual Council of The Episcopal Diocese of Mississippi Natchez Convention Center, January 27-29, 2023



Elisabeth's Epistle

Preparing for Lent

I've had compassion on my mind. I was invited by the Daughters of the King at St. Columb's Episcopal Church in Ridgeland to facilitate a Lenten Quiet Morning on Saturday, Feb. 25 on the theme of compassion. All St. Alban's members and friends are welcome to attend, and I'll have more details soon. The topic of the quiet morning—practicing compassion—has already captured my heart, and I hope it will inspire us this Lent. The theme comes from a Lenten devotional published by Living Compass, which will be available at the church. In this devotional, the writers define compassion as being moved by the suffering of others to respond in a way that alleviates suffering. In other words, compassion is more than just a feeling, it is also a response, and hopefully, action.

But as we all know, there are times when it is difficult to cultivate compassion. Especially during the pandemic, the idea of "compassion fatigue" as it related to our health care workers and first responders entered the popular consciousness. We have all probably had times when we felt depleted, unable to respond with compassion to the suffering we see around us. This Lent, we are invited to reflect on compassion—what it is, where it comes from, and how we can develop our capacity for compassion.

As I've been meditating on this theme, I've been picturing compassion as a reservoir. We don't fill our reservoirs of compassion ourselves; rather, they are filled from a source-from The Source of all love and compassion. Our Source, our living God, is pure compassion, revealed most clearly for us in the life and death of Jesus Christ. Depending on the level of your reservoir, one of your tasks this Lent might be to strengthen your connection to this Source, through intentional prayer practices and time set aside to be with God and to experience God's compassion.

But what feeds the reservoir is only one part of our compassion "system." Reservoirs also have dams and spillways for regulating the flow of the water out of the reservoir. When the water level gets too low, the spillway is closed to give the reservoir a chance to refill. I think of spillways as the "rule of life" that guides us in setting healthy boundaries so that we don't give more of ourselves than is sustainable. This might include practices like Sabbath, limits on technology use, and attending to our health and wellness. Lent might be a time to look at our spillway—if we're being depleted too quickly, what might need to change in the structure of our days and weeks?

Finally, reservoirs have a purpose. Our largest area reservoir, "the Rez," isn't just a recreational area; it supplies drinking water to the Jackson metro area. It meets critical needs and relieves human suffering. We are like that, too. Jesus gave us a new commandment: love one another as he has loved us. We were created to show compassion, created to be moved by the suffering of others and respond. If your reservoir is full, and your spillway is in good shape, maybe your task this Lent is to clarify your purpose. Where are you being called to act with compassion in the world right now? Who or what is moving you to respond to relieve suffering? I look forward to a Lent in which we intentionally work to increase our capacity to respond to the world with compassion.
