## Bishop Theodore Bratton's Private Communion Set A Treasured Antique at St. Alban's

In March of 1999, Harvey Smith, a long-time member of St. Alban's Church, was surfing the Internet when he came across an item on eBay described as an "1850s Sterling Silver Communion Set, BEAUTIFUL." The owner provided a brief history of the set: "This set was



presented to the Rev. F. E. Thalmann by the Rev. John Gass, Rector, 1942-48. It belonged to the Rt. Rev. Theodore Bratton, Bishop of Mississippi, and was made in the early 19th century."

Harvey, an antique dealer, immediately went into action to verify the authenticity of the private communion set and to find out more information regarding its history. After an inquiry, Harvey received a note from Mark Blanchet of New York stating, "This piece belongs to an elderly acquaintance of mine. She [resident of Albany, New York] received it from a man (reverend) that she was engaged to many years ago. He died before they were to be married and I am not sure whether he gave it to her before he died or in his will." Anxious to bid on the item, Harvey looked up the markings on the piece and discovered that the communion set had been made in 1855 by George Unite in Birmingham, England.

The item quickly doubled in price as the bidding continued on eBay. Convinced that the communion set should belong to St. Alban's, Harvey consulted with Easy Biedenharn, Bryan Brabston and The Rev. William Carlin, rector of St. Alban's from 1998—2002. They agreed to contribute to the purchase.

On St. Patrick's Day, Harvey received a note from Mark Blanchet who was handling the sale. The note read, "Hello...I have just been informed that you are the high bidder on the 1850s STERLING Silver Communion set. BEAUTIFUL. I hope to help you in any way that I can to make the transition from bid to possession as smooth as possible." The total cost of the communion set was \$570.85. Harvey later discovered that the person bidding against him was Sherry Scott from Waycross, Georgia. The communion set was shipped from Cohoes, New York, to St. Alban's where church members received the treasure with great joy.

Sam Bratton, grandson of Bishop Theodore Bratton, later contacted Harvey asking to purchase the communion set for his father who wished to donate it to either All Saints' School, Vicksburg, or St. Mary's College, Raleigh, North Carolina. Bishop Bratton had helped to establish both Episcopal schools for girls. Harvey politely declined Sam's offer to purchase.

Today, Bishop Bratton's private communion set is proudly displayed under glass in the hallway of the Parish Hall. Although Harvey has dealt with more expensive items in the antique business, he would be the first to say that Bishop Bratton's private communion set was the most precious item that he ever had the good fortune to purchase. The St. Alban's community thanks Harvey Smith, Bryan Brabston, Easy Biedenharn and Reverend William Carlin for securing this treasured item.

### ♥Billie's Corner

For this hope we were saved. But hope that is seen is no hope at all. Who hopes for what they already have? But if we hope for what we do not yet have, we wait for it patiently.

Romans 8: 24 & 25

Dear Saint Alban's Community,

Just what is hope? Is it wishful thinking? Something like, "I hope it doesn't rain tomorrow," or "I hope my team wins the Super Bowl." Is there more to hope than the causal way it is used in everyday conversations?

During the past month, I have been reading a book entitled *The Twelve Days of Christmas*: *Unwrapping the Gifts*, by Brother Curtis Almquest of the Society of Saint John the Evangelist. It is a little book that is overflowing with reflections on the good gifts in life—love, forgiveness, joy, hope and so on.

Although the author's intention may have been to unwrap a gift each day during the twelve days of Christmas, it takes far longer than twelve days to absorb the wisdom that Almquest offers. Reading this little book cannot be rushed—it takes time to unwrap the gifts.

I keep returning to the chapter entitled *The Gift of Hope*. I had not given hope a lot of thought. The colloquial use of hope was as deep as I have gone.

What does it mean to have hope in God? Almquest says, "Hope is a sense of the possible—a sense that something will change, that something will come. Hope is fueled by the presence of God in our lives. But hope is also fueled by the future of God in our lives. Hope lies in what is possible, not what is predictable."

Hope is about trusting the Divine Mystery in our lives. Saint Paul wrote, "Who hopes for what they already have?"

The season of Lent is fast approaching. During the Lenten season, it is customary to make a commitment to special spiritual practices. This year, at Saint Alban's Church, let's make *HOPE* our special practice. Let's simply get better aquatinted with *HOPE*—let's give hope a chance to take on a deeper significance in our lives.

We can begin with the daily practice of praying the words of Saint Paul found in Romans 8:24 & 25. I am going to listen for *HOPE* in the lectionary readings as I

prepare sermons during Lent. I will post Scripture and prayers that pertain to HOPE in our weekly announcements.

Look for *HOPE*—in what you read, in how you pray and in your daily life. Share your experiences with others. The possibilities are endless.

Who will we be on Easter Sunday after we have actively sought *HOPE* during the six weeks of Lent? Where will *HOPE* send us in our lives as Christians?

### January 9— Julia Chester Emery


served forty years as


#### January—16 Richard Benson, Charles Gore & Phillips Brooks



**Richard Benson,** a priest in the Church of England, was the founder of St. John the Evangelist (SSJE) in Oxford, England, 1866. Following the English Reformation, SSJE was the first established religious community for men. Benson wrote the original *SSJE Rule of Life*.

**Charles Gore** founded the Community of the Resurrection, a community of men that attempted to combine religious life and ministry in the modern world.

Gore's ministry pricked the conscience of the church in its approach to the work of social justice.



**Phillips Brooks,** Bishop of Massachusetts, was big in stature—6'4" tall and weighed 300 lbs. He was an ardent preache

He was an ardent preacher whose sermons are still read today! Brooks influence was so great at Harvard that a building, pulpit and preaching series bears his name. He penned the lyrics to "O Little Town of Bethlehem" after a visit to the Holy Land.
