

The Living Nativity



This year we are excited to have more congregation involvement. The congregation helped to buy and wrap gifts and deliver them to the needy families.





Do You Know the Way Home?

Funeral Homily

Jesus said, "In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also."

Betty Biedenharn knew the way home. She knew it in every sense. She knew what it was to grow deep, lasting roots in a place, to cultivate a home over a long lifetime of settling down and committing to one community. She knew what it was to grow a home—to add children and animals and friends of children and then spouses of children and then grandchildren and eventually great-grandchildren...to build rooms onto the house to accommodate a growing brood. She also knew what it was to expand the room in your heart, not just for family members, but for ever-expanding circles of friends and church family. She built a home that was brimming with hospitality, with generosity, with laughter, with love. Everyone gathered here today is a testimony to that, to the abundance of her love.

On her 99th birthday, we asked Betty to tell us some stories, and a surprising one emerged about how fast she would drive as she was running errands back and forth to town. She told us about driving a man whose truck was broken down into town and glancing back at him in the back seat only to find him fervently praying as she sped down Hwy 80. Another person who worked at the farm would hear the sound of her car on the gravel road speeding toward them and say, "Here she comes, here she comes!"

I love the image of Betty speeding down the road that led back home...she knew the way home, and she loved her home deeply, so deeply she just couldn't wait to get back. In these last months, as she made trips to the hospital, her persistent question was always when she could go home. I think that once she made it back home this last time, part of her couldn't bear to leave the place she had loved so much, the sounds and smells and familiar people that surrounded her in her last beautiful weeks. She took her time saying her goodbyes.

But thing is, Betty also knew the way home in the larger sense. She didn't just know the way back to the farm, as much as she loved it and as much as her life revolved around it and her family. The farm was one center of her life, but this church was the other. Part of me still expects to look up and see Betty in her pew, to see her light up as she greeted people, or received communion. This church and her faith were her bedrock. The Psalm we read together, Psalm 121, was her favorite. Betty told us that she said that psalm to herself as she sat on her porch, looking out at the hills around her house. "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help? My help cometh even from the Lord who hath made heaven and earth... The

Lord <u>himself</u> is thy keeper...it is even he that shall keep thy soul." In other words, Betty knew who she belonged to, and where her permanent home was. She knew that this earthly home and this church were just some of the many dwelling places in her Father's house. She knew there would come a day when Jesus would come and lead her all the way home, directly into the presence of God.

She knew that her eternal home was not on this earth. That was another story we told on her 99th birthday. We talked about her dear sister Letty, about how different the two of them were, even though they were twins. About how Letty was outgoing and how she was always running late. Betty said she spent her entire life waiting for Letty. We joked that day that now the tables were turned and Betty was the one who was keeping Letty waiting. Betty loved that. But the reality was that Betty herself was getting tired of waiting. As much as she loved her family and friends who surrounded her here in this world, she missed her family and friends who had gone on to the next. She was ready for her reunion with not only Letty, but also her husband, and others. That is the particular beautiful ache of living to age 100, that, even as you are surrounded by loved ones, there are so many more who have passed on to Jordan's farther shore.

There is no more waiting for Betty. That is at the heart of why we gather today. Her wait is over. She knew the way home. She knew that 100 years in this life is a short prelude to what is to come. And yet how well she spent her 100 years among us. How well she built a family and a home and a church. How wide and deep is her legacy of hospitality and generosity. But Betty has been called home. In the words of Henry van Dyke, in his poem, *Gone from My Sight*, "just at the moment when someone says, 'there, she is gone,' there are other eyes watching her coming, and other voices ready to take up the glad shout, 'here she comes!"

Here she comes! Here she comes! We bid her Godspeed in her journey and pray through the grace of God that we will see her soon.

But then I think about some of the wonderful experiences we've had together: all of our outdoor celebrations this year as we tried to stay one step ahead of the coronavirus; our joy as we have seen more and more people coming back after receiving their vaccinations; and even the pure delight that Salome, the church kitty, has brought us. It is in showing people around that I remember how much our church has been through, how much history has come and gone, and how God has graced St. Alban's with the endurance to keep preaching the Gospel in unsteady and uncertain times. No matter what the new year brings, good, unexpected, or disappointing, St. Alban's will continue to be a beacon in our community of the steady and unfailing presence of God with us.



Altar improvements



The altar in the nave could use some cleaning, oiling and improvements. The top level of the altar where the flowers and tabernacle sit is water stained and has an unfinished warped board that is attached to the back of the altar.

The Vestry has approved a minor alteration that involves a complete overlay on the top level of the altar with a finished oak board, stained and varnished to match the existing altar. This will raise the top level ³/₄ of an inch, making it match the level of the Credence table. We should have the overlay finished in the next few weeks and will install it temporarily on the altar, pending final approval by the Vestry.



195th Annual Council in Natchez January 28-30, 2022



Annual Council, which is the annual meeting of the Diocese of Mississippi, is being hosted by Trinity Episcopal Church in Natchez in celebration of their 200th anniversary over the weekend of January 28–30, 2022.

Council business meetings will be held at the Natchez Convention Center, in the heart of downtown Natchez. The Convention Center is conveniently located within a few minutes' walk of a number of restaurants, hotels, bed and breakfast establishments and shopping.

Dunleith antebellum home will be the site of the Saturday evening social gathering. In addition, we hope that you will join us at Trinity Church during the Saturday lunch break to celebrate 200 years as a congregation. It will be a festive occasion! The closing Eucharist Service on Sunday will be held at Trinity Church at 10:00 a.m.

In addition to Rev. Elisabeth and Deacon Josie, St. Alban's will be sending three delegates to Annual Council—Janice Herrington, Betsy Selby and Kerri Williams. Other members planning to attend as visitors are welcome and encouraged to come down to Natchez, especially for the closing Eucharist on Sunday morning, January 30. If you want to participate in the other events of Council as a visitor, you will need to register by going to the Diocesan website. You do not need to register to attend the closing Eucharist—as we get closer, watch the announcements for the time and location.
