































Flying Guests at the Church

St. Alban's has always been home to bees, but we are trying out a partnership with a local beekeeper as we look into what we can do to respond to the dramatic decline in the bee population and be good stewards of our land. To this end, we are experimenting with the placement of a beehive at the far end of the field, close to the road. Steve Bailey, our beekeeper, will be managing the hive, and will also help us with the relocation of some problematic bees in a cedar tree in the cemetery closer to the church. Rev. Elisabeth's Epistle

Over the past eight weeks, I have been blessed to be part of one of the most powerful groups that St. Alban's hosts, our grief support group, Walking the Mourner's Path. While the specific stories shared in our group over the past eight weeks are confidential, I do want to pass on some of the lessons we have learned together. They seem important to me at this moment in our collective life, as we continue to process the events of the past year of living through a pandemic.

I am convinced that all of us have experienced grief this past year, although we may not recognize what we've been through as grief. Whether we have lost friends or family members, or whether our losses are less tangible, like a loss of routine or a loss of our sense of safety, we emerge from this time carrying wounds. For some of us, getting back our sense of normalcy will be relatively easy. But for others, we need time to reflect on those people and things we have lost. We need time to figure out what this new beginning will look like, and how we have been changed. We may not be ready yet for things to "go back to normal." We may need to grieve. Here are some guideposts along the journey through grief that we talk about in Walking the Mourner's Path:

- You are not alone. The most important lesson we have learned is that none of us is alone in our grief. At the end of our groups, we pray together, acknowledging that we do together "what we cannot do alone." The church is a place to bring your grief and know that you are not alone.
- There is no "right way" to grieve and no timeline for finishing grieving. Despite popular ideas about stages of grief, grief looks different for each person and proceeds at its own pace. Grief takes as long as it takes, and there is nothing wrong with that.
- Grief is physical, cognitive, emotional, and spiritual--it affects all aspects of our lives and functioning and shows up in a myriad of surprising ways, from stomach aches and shortness of breath, to difficulty concentrating and anger at God. There is not an area of our lives that grief does not touch.

There is no way around grief, only through it. Avoiding grief or pushing it aside merely delays it. The way through grief is to experience it. On the other side of grief, however, is renewed joy and reengagement with life. This is the journey we walk as Christians, the pattern of resurrection that we look for all around us.

Reflecting on this past year I have revisited one of the lessons I taught in school.

Take the example a loaf of bread. It starts with the farmer who grows the wheat, the workers who harvest it, the miller who grinds it and the distributor who delivers it to the bakery.

The baker bakes the bread, slices, and packages it and sends it to another distributor. The bread is then shipped to retailers who unpack it and put it out on shelves for sale. The end-point transportation is done by truck. It might be shipped by rail, but a truck delivered it. It might travel by cargo ship, but it was a truck that delivered it.

You can substitute another product that you use and arrive at the same conclusion. All workers are essential because in the chain of supply and demand if one cog is not working properly the wheel cannot move.

We all depend on each other whether we want to admit it or not. Remember last week when the refinery software was hacked and there was a delay in gas delivery? People panicked, the price of gas went up and prices of food did so as well.

Reflect on the collect from the BCP on page 134 and count your blessings.
