

Bishop Brian R. Seage Calls for Election of Successor


## Election of a New Bishop

By now you have probably heard that our Diocesan Bishop, Rt. Rev. Brian Seage, has called for the election of a new bishop. As a member of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, I want to share with you the nuts and bolts of the process and our preliminary timeline. The President of the Standing Committee, Rev. Jody Burnett, communicated much of this in a recent email to the diocese, but it also bears repeating.

In general, the role of the Standing Committee during this process will be one of oversight and coordination. We have engaged a consultant, Rev. Ron Clingenpeel, who has experience shepherding multiple dioceses through this very type of transition. Ron has explained the customary way that the process is carried out. Here's what you should know:

- The Standing Committee appoints and charges two committees made up of laypeople and clergy to carry out this process: a Search Committee and a Transition Committee.
- The Search Committee will be chaired by Alice Perry, who has served the diocese in a variety of roles including work on the Standing Committee and Chair of the Commission on Ministry.
- The Standing Committee has released an application for the Search Committee, which outlines the selection criteria and asks a number of reflective questions of prospective members.
- The Search Committee will work to assemble a slate of candidates for Bishop.
- At the point that the Standing Committee approves the Search Committee's slate
  of candidates, the Transition Committee will take over. The Transition Committee
  will conduct "walkabouts," opportunities for the people of the diocese to meet the
  slate of candidates in person and ask them questions.
- The Transition Committee will work with the Standing Committee and the Diocesan staff to conduct the election, which we hope will take place at Diocesan Council in February 2024.
- After the election concludes, the Transition Committee will then work with relevant groups from around the diocese to plan and execute the consecration of the new bishop and will work to coordinate the new bishop's entry into the diocese.

This is an exciting time for the Episcopal Church in Mississippi. There are a multitude of ways that interested people can be involved, from applying to one of these committees to attending a walkabout to serving as a parish delegate to the Council which will elect our new bishop. I encourage you both to engage with the process as you are able and to ask Elisabeth or me any questions you might have.

#### Hiding the "Alleluia"... And Other Changes During Lent

On the last Sunday after Epiphany, the children were tasked with coloring pages with the word "Alleluia" on them. Then, at the Peace, the children were invited to bring their "Alleluias" up to the sanctuary and hide them behind the altar. Why was "Alleluia" going into hiding? Because this was the last Sunday, we would be saying it until Easter Sunday. Starting the following Wednesday, Ash Wednesday, the church enters the season of Lent, the forty days preceding Easter.

During Lent, you will notice several changes around the church that mark this as a season focused on simplicity and repentance. The altar furnishings will be much simpler—wood and pottery instead of brass and silver. We will refrain from having flowers on the altar. The first Sunday of Lent we will say together The Great Litany, intercessory prayers that focus us on our need for repentance and on God's mercy. You will see a crucifix hanging behind the pulpit instead of our usual banner. All of this helps us set Lent apart in our hearts and minds as a time of preparation to encounter the Paschal mystery at Easter.

#### St. Alban's Volunteers Tutor Children at Lifting Lives



St. Alban's tutoring program at *Lifting Lives Family Shelter* is off to a great start. The sessions take place on Sunday afternoons from 3:00-4:00 PM. Lots of children's smiles and laughter greet St. Alban's volunteers as they arrive to play learning games with the children. The games depend on the ages of the children. At present *Lifting Lives* averages eight children ranging in age from 4-14. The original plan for tutoring was to offer help with homework and other schoolwork. However, we found that the children didn't always have their folders or Chromebooks with them on weekends.

Instead, we decided to play educational games that reinforce what they are learning in school and fill in the gaps. This has been a big success as the children want to come inside to play games. The younger children had great fun last week playing *Sight Word Bingo*, a game that takes the traditional *Bingo* game and replaces the numbers with words, motivating the child to read the 'sight words' so they can play (and win!) the game. The children also love building words with letter blocks. While the younger children played *Sight Word Bingo*, the older children played math games with Buck, especially games that are helpful with those learning Algebra.

#### Elisabeth's Epistle

This is my annual plea to put the liturgies of Holy Week on your calendar and make plans to come to them! Yes, I know we are still a month out. Holy Week is the first week of April, starting April 2 with Palm Sunday and ending April 9 with Easter Sunday. But trust me, if all you experience of Holy Week are the Sundays, you are missing out!

I realize that many members of our church did not grow up in a liturgical tradition that observed all the liturgies of Holy Week, and in particular the Triduum, the services of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil. Even many cradle Episcopalians didn't grow up with these services, which were reintroduced to the church with the 1979 *Book of Common Prayer*. I say "reintroduced" because these are very old traditions that go back to the earliest centuries of the church. They slow us down as we approach Easter so that we can feel the full weight of what God has done and is doing for us. Here's a quick introduction to what we'll be doing in between the Sundays of Holy Week:

- Holy Wednesday, April 5, 6:00 PM: We'll join our friends from the other Warren County Episcopal Churches at Christ Church for Tenebrae, a service of light and shadows that provides an extended meditation on Christ's Passion using Psalms and readings from Lamentations.
- Maundy Thursday, April 6, 6:00 PM: We'll gather for an agape dinner in the Parish Hall, remembering how Jesus gathered with his disciples at the Last Supper. This is a family-friendly service, with music and movement.
- Good Friday, April 7, 12:00 and 6:00 PM: We gather for a solemn service remembering Christ's crucifixion and bringing the suffering of our world today to the foot of the cross.
- Easter Vigil, Saturday, April 8, Time TBD: Come join our reimagined Easter Vigil as we tell the stories of salvation around a campfire at the Outdoor Chapel, then rejoice with the first alleluias and hymns of Easter in the church!

My hope is that you will recognize Holy Week for what it is: our most sacred week of the year, a time when we are plunged into the deepest mysteries of God's redeeming love. And I hope you will set aside time to join in as many of our liturgies as you can. Your experience of Easter will be immeasurably enriched.
