

Annual Parish Meeting Slated for January 28

There is a 'spirit hymn' we like to sing at St. Alban's, usually with Lance Stewart accompanying on the guitar. The chorus says it all—

Here I am, Lord, is it I Lord? I have heard You calling in the night. I will go, Lord, if you lead me. I will hold Your people in my heart.

The lyrics of this hymn are so appropriate for the fast-approaching new year when decisions will be made as to who among us will hear God's calling to serve as new vestry members or hold other church offices? In January there will be three open positions to fill – two new vestry seats and a senior warden.



The Vestry has set the date for the Annual Parish Meeting for Sunday, January 28, 2024, following one service of Holy Eucharist at 10:00 AM. To be eligible to vote in the Annual Meeting, you must be at least 16 years old and a confirmed member of St. Alban's, which means that your membership is recorded in our parish register and you faithfully participate in the life of the church.

Kristi Hall and Clarissa Walker Horner, outgoing vestry members, have served 3-year terms and Penny Freund, senior warden, has served 2-years term. We

need other church members who are willing to take the mantle in 2024.

The vestry meets monthly either by Zoom or in person. Candidates are required to be members of St. Alban's church. The priest and senior warden attend the monthly meetings. The vestry is working to formulate a church mission statement, discuss the use and future of the rectory and report on the stewardship campaign and budget for the coming year. Year round, the vestry also works hand-in-hand with the ECW and Altar Guild, especially when it comes to maintaining church traditions and preparing for large and small events.

We thank everyone, past, present and future, who answers God's call to serve St. Alban's Church. Would you please prayerfully consider joining us on the vestry as we move forward in 2024, asking God for the energy and spirit to grow, to reach out and become one family engaged in God's work.


Elisabeth's Epistle

This is the time of year when my thoughts turn toward gratitude. Starting when the boys were little, we began a tradition of putting a jar in the middle of the dining room table in the weeks leading up to Thanksgiving. Next to the jar are little slips of paper on which we write down things for which we were grateful. We read them around Thanksgiving, and then I put them in a journal organized by year. We enjoy going back and looking over these, noting how the boys' handwriting has changed and how what we were grateful for has changed with our living situation. Some of the earliest slips of paper reflect our gratitude for things like Legos, teachers, and new cousins. Family, friends, dogs, and books perennially make the list.

This exercise teaches us to be more aware of all the good things in our lives and encourages us to communicate our gratitude. This is also the aim of stewardship in the life of the church. Although it's tempting to relegate stewardship to "just something that needs to get done to make a budget," it's more than that. Stewardship asks us to stop, take inventory of our lives, and express our gratitude to God for what we have been blessed with. We can express this gratitude in lots of ways, but one way is to set aside some of our time, talent, & treasure for the service of the church. St. Alban's budget is almost completely dependent on the gifts of members and friends. St. Alban's programming—the events, groups, and classes we offer—are also almost completely dependent on the time and talent of our church members. This is one of the gifts and challenges of a small church: we need everyone to contribute what they can in order to serve this community.

My family pledges to St. Alban's because it's good for us, it's good for the church, and it's good for our community. I often ask myself what kind of hole would be left in the fabric of our community if St. Alban's weren't here. Where would people go for beautiful liturgy combined with warm hospitality? Where else would they find Christian education that takes the Bible seriously and leaves lots of room for questions? Where would they go for an array of healing ministries, from Walking the Mourner's Path, to pastoral counseling, to services honoring grief and loss? Where would the over 40 families we have helped with utility bills so far this year turn? There is so much to be grateful for in our church community. I hope this can be a season for you of reflecting on what you are grateful for, and I hope St. Alban's is on your list.

Ghost Towns and Memories of Times Gone By




When I was growing up in New Mexico, my mother enjoyed collecting old bottles, especially the red, green or blue glass bottles. She and my father would go on weekend excursions to walk around old ghost towns in New Mexico and Arizona. Back then, I didn't really enjoy traipsing through the dust and cobwebs of abandoned old buildings nor did my siblings.


In recent days, however, I've found myself reminiscing about my days out west. I long to go back and watch a roadrunner darting across the road and see tumble weeds rolling along. It would be delightful to enjoy a conversation with my mother's parents. I would ask them how things really were in the early 1900s. I would ask my grandmother what it was like to participate in a cattle drive. And I would ask my great-grandmother what she remembers about the early times— before the advent of cars, telephones, radios and televisions. Also, how long did it take for the piano she ordered from the East Coast to travel by Conestoga wagon all the way to the New Mexico territory?

My grandparents saw the world change in so many ways. They were among the first to drive automobiles, the first to listen to radio programs and the first to watch silent movies and later television. Just like television brought us the vision of the Walton family seated around the radio listening to a program, I'm sure my grandparents did the same. My great-grandmother saw life change from travel on horseback to cars, then airplanes, and lived long enough to see man's journey to the moon. I know we will continue to see major changes in technology - but we will never forget the turn of the century changes that influenced our grandparent's lives.

Regardless of the innovations that were made during their lifetimes, one thing never changed—Jesus Christ's gift of salvation. This was the greatest gift ever in the history of humankind. In past years, when my family and I returned to visit the city of Las Cruces, New Mexico, we were greeted by my favorite sight—three crosses on a small hill just outside the city. The crosses were lit with modern-day electric light bulbs welcoming travelers to the city. They were placed on the hill long before I was born and are still standing today.

No ghosts were seen during those outings spent searching for glass bottles, but we saw plenty of roadrunners and tumbleweeds. The only spirit present was the Spirit of the Lord.
